The first ever community research training held since the beginning of ICTP training had its opening ceremony on the 11TH of March 2011, and was held over one week. A total of 15 participants were registered in the time that the training was advertised, but in the end 10 participants were able to finish the course successfully and received their certificates.

The training was conducted by Dr Silipa Silipa, who has an extensive education in Research. Some of the criteria discussed during the training were: research methods, data collection methods, managing research, presenting research and etc. This training was made possible through funding from In-Country Training Programme (ICTP) and was coordinated by SUNGO.

SUNGO's main goal for providing and conducting these training workshops is to improve the knowledge of its member NGOs and their respective communities. We hope that in the future there will be more opportunities like these to improve

A Certificate for Adults Training course started this month at the Oloamanu training centre – the 21st of February to 2nd March 2011. Trainer, Leiataua losefa is leading the one and a half week course and there are 20 participants attending from 15 different NGOs around Samoa. The aim of the course is for participants to learn methods of teaching adults in Samoan communities. his in turn will encourage capacity building and skills development of NGOs, CBOs and community groups.

The course was coordinated under the In-Country Training Program, through the Samoa Umbrella Organisation for Non-Governmental Organisations. The NUS course is made up of two parts: CAT101 and CAT102 which each have to be successfully passed for participants to become certified adult trainers. This course is funded by NZAid, AusAID and the Government of Samoa. On 25th of March, this class of adults celebrate their graduation with honour and pride.

CSSP: CBOs Opportunity for Projects Managing

The 14TH of February 2011, was the opening day for the CSSP training that was held at the Central Bank Training Centre. A total of 29 participants for the course burst through the front door of the Central Bank of Samoa, one by one making their ways up to the 6TH floor. Each day was spent learning new ideas and how to manage a special project and it was a thrill to see how they were so keen to learn more through these courses.

There were four trainers for the course; lead trainer, Manu Aoete Apelu, and his co-trainers Italia Leau, Imeleta Iosefo and Saimasi Suataga. Each of these trainers dedicated themselves to sharing their knowledge in Managing Projects, and its stages of development: planning, monitoring, finance and reporting. These modules were used as a guideline for this training. In the beginning of this course 29 participants attended, 27 of whom were able to

finish the course after five days of observing and sharing

The main focus of this course was to train our NGO members in becoming more efficient in forming their special projects. This course was funded by the Civil Society Support Programme (CSSP), and coordinated by Samoa Umbrella for Non-Governmental Organisation (SUNGO).

A Multi-million Dollar Deal for Samoa

Friday the 25TH of March this year marked a special day for the Civil Society Support Programme (CSSP) and all the NGOs, CBOs and also the NSA, that took part in this program. A special ceremony was held to commemorate the signing of a \$9 850 000 funding deal for Samoa, \$5 500 000 of which will go to CSSP. The signing was between Faumuina Tiatia Liuga who was representing Samoa as the new Minister of Finance, and the honourable Weipke Van Der Goot, EU Ambassador and EU Head of Delegation. The agreement between the two countries will focus on developing the Civil Base Society in Samoa. It was based on supporting organisation for funding. This occasion was not only witnessed by members of CBOs, NSA, but also by the Board members of the Samoa Umbrella for Non-Governmental Organisations (SUNGO), government agencies and development partners who have joined forces in this programme. This funding was also allocated to assist Samoa in recovery from the impact of the global financial crisis on economy and government revenue. It was designed to promote change between the government and NGOs and strengthen their relationship to help them work together under one roof. A total of \$3 million (approximately 9,090,000 WST) will be spent each year for the next three to four years for those NGOs and CBOs who applied and had projects approved under the CSSP.

A Bright Future for the Youth of Lelepa

When you drive through the small village of Lelepa in Savai'i it seems a quiet place. But behind the scenes in this peaceful village there is a whole lot going on. The villagers have been working together with the Lelepa EFKS to build the skills, confidence and responsibility of the youth in their community. One of Lelepa EFKS's main projects is educating the youth in developing the land and caring for the taro plantations. Fa'anati Maiseli, wife of Reverend Maiseli Matamu, says she believes that getting the youth involved in work on plantations will give them the responsibility they need to become future leaders of the community.

"We are trying to educate our youth members in ways of leadership, so they don't have to be told what to do... they have to work hard and look after these things."

There are over 30 people involved in the youth project, most between the ages of 17 and 35. While the project is organised by the EFKS, the youth themselves hold most of the responsibility. Giving young people in rural areas an opportunity to work and earn money in their own village is important as it encourages them to stay and build their communities. Many Samoan youth leave their villages or even the country in search of work or further education. For those who stay life can be a struggle.

"Most of the people here, where we are staying, after high school they think that's the end of it. There are still people who continue on with their education, but the majority stay here in the village," Fa'anati says.

"They are working for the village matai system. That's alright but we have to work with them so they know that's a job for them."

Three years ago Lelepa EFKS became a member of the Samoa Umbrella for Non-Governmental Organisations (SUNGO). Fa'anati says she sees SUNGO as another type of community where the EFKS can find support from similar groups and organisations.

"We've been exposing ourselves to other people, to listen to other advice and thoughts and good ways of developing. And also we expose ourselves to other communities and to somewhere that we can get assistance with our projects."

SUNGO has been working with community groups like Lelepa EFKS for over a decade and seeing achievements like this youth project is one of the many rewards. CEO of SUNGO, Roina Vavatau says that the organisation is driven by the need to work with local communities and NGOs to secure a bright future in Samoa.

"The most important part of SUNGO's mission is working with communities and NGOs, assisting them to assess their needs and direction, and then helping them to implement innovative schemes like the Lelelpa EFKS's youth project."

As they prepare to go out to the plantation the boys are in high spirits, laughing and mucking around. Hard work has brought happiness and purpose to the youth of Lelepa community.

UNITEC Training Boosts Opportunities for Samoan Students.

Six female Samoan students attended courses in Samoa in March with aim of completing their graduate diploma in Not Profit Management. A total of 22 students from the Pacific were chosen to complete this diploma under scholarship scheme. This course was run through UNITEC and Samoa Umbrella for Non-Governmental Organisation (SUNGO), and was held at Moanalisa Hotel in Vaitele from the 23RD to the 30TH of March.

The two courses were entitled 'Community Funding and Entrepreneurship' and 'Values Based Management and Leadership'. After completing these courses the student will be attending a further two courses in Suva, Fiji before their graduation.

Originally 30 Samoans students who were expected to graduate this course as part of a 240 students across the
